- A UK Honours Degree at a minimum of second class (2:2) or equivalent related to the field of criminology, criminal justice, or forensic psychology etc.
- If you don't meet these requirements, your application may be considered based on a minimum of 36 months of appropriate work experience with a CV and reference.
- IELTS 6.5 (no less than 6.0 in any element); or TOEFL iBT 90; or equivalent; Alternatively, we can accept evidence that you have previously studied in English.

Level 7 core modules

Reflective Practice and Leadership (20 credits)

Working within the criminal justice system can be challenging, and the effects it can have on practitioners have been well documented. This module will explore emotional readiness as a foundation before introducing you to the challenges faced within this field. You will be coached towards the development of skills needed for resilience and sustained well-being, leading and managing teams in complex and challenging situations, and collaborative work relationships. You will also learn how research can be used to inform policy. The module will help you to:

- Analyse the impact working within the criminal justice system can have on physical, psychological, and social health.
- Evaluate the skills required to build emotional awareness, resilience and coping strategies, including the benefit of effective supervision.
- Evaluate the skills required to successfully lead teams in complex and challenging situations within the criminal justice system.
- Critically discuss the complexities of conducting work across different agencies within the field of sexual and violent crime.

The Criminal Justice System and Globalisation (20 credits)

This module will equip you with a critical understanding of the progress made and challenges faced within the criminal justice system in England and Wales. It will explore the evolution of the criminal justice system, analysing adaptions made in relation to responding to emerging types of serious, organised, and violent crime. There will be an emphasis on existing frameworks and issues in policing, probation, and prisons. The module also embeds the area of 'digital justice' within the courts and legal system and the implementation of 'virtual courts'. You will learn to:

- Critically evaluate the progress made, and challenges faced, by the criminal justice system in responding to modern and transnational crime.
- Critically assess governing legislation, together with the processes and the work of the UK and international agencies engaged in the prevention of transnational crime
- Evaluate recent efforts to embed 'digital justice' within the courts and legal system.
- Demonstrate a critical understanding of contemporaneous issues in policing, probation, and prisons.

The Psychology of Serious Offending (20 credits)

The discipline of psychology can help us understand why people might commit crimes, how to investigate them, and how we can work with offenders to support positive rehabilitation. This module will serve as an introduction to the psychology of offending with a focus on forensic and investigative psychology. It will introduce you to advances in forensic psychology and how psychology as a whole has helped shape the investigative process in the UK. You will also gain insight into the complexity of sentencing serious offenders. The module will teach you to:

- Critically analyse different theoretical approaches to explaining serious and violent offending.
- Critically discuss the relationships between psychological disorders and serious crimes.
- Reflect on the current and historic approaches to offender profiling and investigative psychology.
- Appraise the challenges faced by practitioners when dealing with mentally disordered offenders accused of serious crimes.

Managing Intelligence and Investigations (20 credits)

Following a chronological sequence, this module will explore intelligence gathering and analysis, incidents and operation management, and effective investigations. You will learn what intelligence is, how it can guide decision-making towards the management of an effective operation, and the challenges faced by practitioners when utilising intelligence. The module will also examine the use of surveillance, how investigations have been shaped by technological advances, and the multifaceted nature of evidence collection. You will develop the skills to:

- Evaluate how effective surveillance and intelligence can be utilised during the detection and disruption of crime, whilst also recognising agency business drivers such as political and economic pressures.
- Identify and analyse relevant issues related to privacy and data protection.
- Evaluate how intelligence can inform effective incident and investigation management.
- Reflect critically on case studies where effective (or noneffective) incident management has impacted an ongoing case.

Terrorism, Extremism and Hate (20 credits)

This module will develop your knowledge of the various manifestations of online hate crimes and extremism. You will be introduced to the online extremist 'ecosystem' to gain a deeper appreciation of the nexus between hate crime, hate speech, and the promotion of terrorism. The role of 'fake news' and disinformation in fueling online hate speech will be investigated through case studies on active right-wing extremists. Finally, the module will explore a range of civil society initiatives for countering online hate and extremism. It will equip you with the skills to:

- Critically analyse radicalisation processes and their broader connection to online extremism and hate.
- Analyse the reciprocal relationship between online and offline hate crime and extremism as well as their role in the promotion of terrorism.
- Reflect critically on a range of online/offline hate crimes through an evaluation and application of real-world case studies.
- Evaluate measures to detect and counter online hate crime and extremism as well as the risk factors for victimisation.

Cybercrime and the Dark Web (20 credits)

Technology is now pivotal in our everyday lives, which has brought with it the opportunity for crime to be committed in new and diverse ways. This module will equip you with a critical understanding of the complexities of cybercrime, and the challenges faced by criminal justice agencies, businesses, and organisations in the face of cybercrime. It will also explore the darknet in the context of emerging crime trends and how authorities are attempting to monitor, investigate, and prevent these crimes. The module will teach you the skills to:

- Critically examine and discuss the theoretical perspectives that relate to the study of cybercrime.
- Critically assess the right to freedom of speech and expression in respect of public protection and safety.
- Demonstrate a critical understanding of key concepts such as grooming, incitement, coercion, radicalisation, and the darknet.
- Analyse the threats of the darknet and the harms associated with the use of the darknet.

Independent Research Project (60 credits)

Your modules culminate in the undertaking of an independent research project in an area of your choice within the field of criminology. Through this, you will have the opportunity to develop your skills in the planning, design, analysis, and dissemination of subject-specific research, gaining a first-hand appreciation of how research can inform policy. Your work should aim to offer new insights into your area of choice and therefore positively contribute to future research and practice. Your learning outcomes at the end of the module include the skills to:

- Conduct a comprehensive literature review in an area of specialism, arriving at sound research questions and/or aims through the application of critical evaluation.
- Make robust research design decisions based on a theoretical understanding of methodologies.
- Critically analyse data using various techniques and appreciate the advantages/disadvantages of qualitative/quantitative research.
- Reflect critically on your own practice, identifying limitations of the current research project and directions for future research.
